## Journal Selection Criteria

- Diamond Open Access (no cost to the author or reader)
- Digital Humanities
- Published 5+ issues
- Published within the last year OR within past 2 years with current call for proposals
- Journal site is available in English
- Prioritize variety in subject matter and publishing platform



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

### **Inclusivity Strategies for Journal Staff**

### Is your journal site accessible?

- Current Issue and Journal Mission are accessible from the main page
- ☐ Tagged headings (<h1>, <h2>, etc.)?
- Visibly distinct headings (noticeably larger than body text, etc.)
- Text color contrast ratio in compliance with accessibility standards (WCAG)
- Succinct and visually distinct links (underlined, a noticeable color)
- Descriptively labeled links
   ("Past Issues" vs. "click here")
- Information in the footer is restated on another page if necessary

### Do you describe the journal's relationship to accessibility, DEI, or language?

☐ Accessibility guidelines for submissions

### Are the journal's editorial processes clearly described?

- □ Publication schedule
- Average time from submission to decision
- Primary reviewer concerns to consider prior to submission
- ☐ Style guide or Submission Template
- ☐ Feedback and revision process overview

### Do you consider specific audiences?

- · First time authors, graduate students
- Scholars publishing in a non-primary language
- · Independent/Unaffiliated researchers
- · Professionals new to academic publishing
- Librarians
- · Reviewers

### Journal Review Strategies for Prospective Authors

### Is the journal legitimate?

- □ Visit Think, Check, Submit, for a detailed checklist
- Journal site lists ISSN and any institutional or organizational affiliations
- □ No submission fee
- □ Information about any Article Processing Charges, fees, or waivers upon acceptance
- □ Information about the review process, no guarantee of acceptance or quick review
- ☐ Contact information
- Information about copyright and authors' rights

### Is the journal a good fit?

☐ Review the "Journal Mission" and/or

### Is the journal engaged in inclusive practices?

- Do they have a generally accessible website?
- Do they detail their submission and review process?
- Do they make proactive statements in support of inclusivity, diversity, language support, or accessibility?
- Do they consider accessibility in the submission process?
- Do they provide any additional tips or resources for authors? (checklists, drop-in sessions, etc.)

### You've determined the journal is a good fit. What inclusive actions can you take?

☐ Include alt text and accessible formatting
